As we were escorted to the Wardroom, I glanced at the bulkheads as we climbed the stairs. The framed photos of past Commanding Officers of York were still there. In the Wardroom, we met Paul Simas and other officers of VANGUARD as well as the Commanding Officer of HMCS YORK, Commander Matthew Davies. We also met the committee members of the VANGUARD Branch of the Navy League of Canada.

What followed during the next two hours was one of the most enjoyable Sea Cadet annual reviews I have had the pleasure of observing. The march-pasts were carried out in fine fashion. Joining VANGUARD on deck were the Navy League cadets from NLCC ARK ROYAL, as well as the band from RCSCC HARWOOD in Ajax. The inspection of the parade revealed that all on deck were well turned out.

Demonstrations included a jackstay transfer, a band display, a show of uniforms from past years, and several static displays. The afternoon concluded with the presentation of awards and a ceremony to mark the changing of the ship's Coxswain.

This day had also given me an opportunity to think back 30 years and remind me once again why Sea Cadets and in particular, RCSCC VANGUARD, had meant so very much to me for such a very long time.

And for that, I thank the officers and cadets of VANGUARD for the invitation to join them on this very special day.

It's about leadership, responsibility and service

I recently read an article in the *London Free Press* about the return of a Canadian Officer , Capt Shawn Thompson, after seven months in Afghanistan. What drew my attention was a picture of a woman in uniform identified as Capt Beverly Bast. She was crying. It seems she was Capt. Thompson's Commanding Officer when he joined the Royal Canadian Army Cadets #11 Strathroy at age 12.

I wondered, "Do I have any former cadets in Afghanistan?" I checked my e-mail, and found a message from Corporal Paglinawan, former CPO1 at VANGUARD, wondering how I was doing, saying he missed being a cadet, and that he hoped to visit soon. He was writing from Afghanistan. After reading his message, I understood what Capt Bast felt. A mix of pride in knowing that a cadet of yours became such an outstanding citizen; the honour of serving as that person's leader; the responsibility of acting as a role model, with a bit of fear for their safety; but trusting they were well trained to survive any challenges brought to them.

My corps provided escort services at the Queen's Park Remembrance Day Ceremony. We were helping veterans lay wreaths, while the Canadian Forces provided sentries for the memorial wall. Afterward, a tall, intimidating man in Army uniform bearing a C7 rifle came over. He marched up to me, stopped, saluted and shook my hand! It was Private Kyle Payne, another of my former cadets who joined VANGUARD at 12 years of age, and upon retirement from his Sea Cadet service,

joined the Army. He was smart looking and a definite asset to

the Canadian Forces.

Looking at these examples, I knew what being a cadet instructor is all about. It is about building relationships that will last a lifetime. It's about leadership; it's about responsibility; and it's about service. The rewards we get far outweigh any rank or pay. I have seen several of my former cadets serving with the Canadian Forces. Greater even are the number of those who did not join the Forces, but have become outstanding community citizens! I am equally proud and honoured to have served with all of them! I can't wait for the day when I get to salute one of

them! I am deeply honoured and
